The culinary courses use innovative lesson plans and activities to teach a wide range of topics which include nutrition, food preparation and sanitation, serving and catering, and cooking skills. Advanced coursework provides job shadowing and internship opportunities at local restaurants and hotel kitchens. The Cougar Cafe houses a full-scale commercial kitchen and an eating area that seats seventy-five people.

Among Kennedy's other curricular offerings include numerous art offerings, a robust and award-winning marching band, orchestra, color guard, choir, The Clarion, a wide variety of foreign language offerings, and numerous advanced placement classes in English, Social Science, Science, Math, Art, and World Languages.

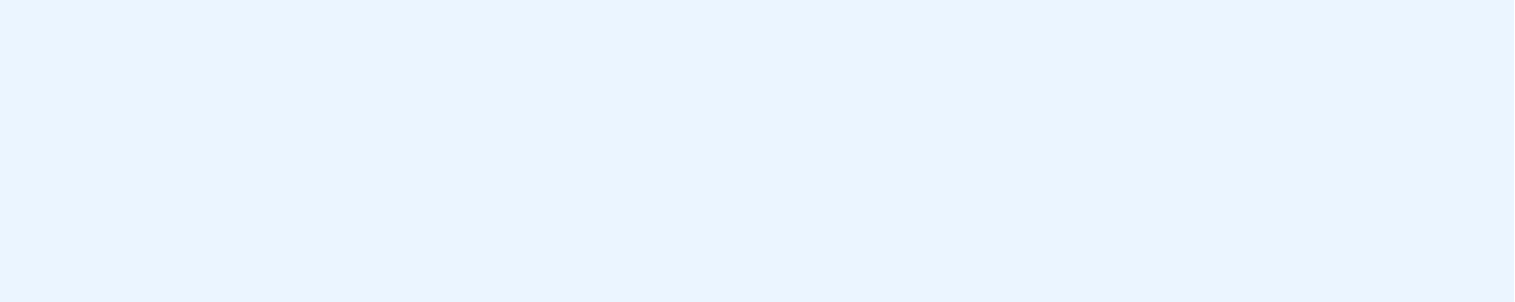
